It indulges mental, emotional, behavioral, and psychological challenges in which a person shows the flexibility and adjustment not only in the external world but also internally.

Resilience in the main characters

Kamala Markandaya is an expert at painting the realistic portrait of life in her novels. Her Famous work 'Nectar in a Sieve' is a great source of Indian rural life. Indian rural life is blessed with emotional strength, so the abstract idea of resilience comes alive. He has a small mud house and a piece of land for his livelihood. She feels pain at the first sight of his house, as she narrates, "I wanted to cry. This mud hut, nothing but mud and thatch, was my home." (Markandaya 07) But accepts it calmly. Her father's financial problems were not hidden from her. So, she accepts it quickly and tries to mend her condition in this small hut. Over time, she ignores the negative aspects of his husband's house rather than stay positive in her life. She adapts to all the changes quickly to live a happy life in adverse conditions. Her experience in gardening is helpful to sow the seed of happiness in her life. In her small garden of a mud house, she grows vegetables and other edible plants. By the little attempts at gardening, she and her family may keep their body and soul together. By her wisdom, she established herself as a farmer's wife from a sheltered village girl. It is her resilience that she quickly learns how a good homemaker manages and supports her family with limited means and resources.

Next thing that depicts Rukmani as a resilient woman is her emotional strength," I cried and cried, until I could cry no more, then I picked up the burden of my life again." (Markandaya) These lines are enough to show Rukmani's mental and emotional state. The main cause of her mental and emotional strength is that she allows herself to grieve in her life but moves forward with determination. She faces several pains, penury, sorrow, and loss of her children. Even to keep her body and soul together seems so difficult in her life. Amid the situation, she maintains her emotional equilibrium. She does everything in her life with firm determination. Sometimes she feels dejected, but she doesn't carry these thoughts for so long. What pains and problems come in her life, she passes them with hope for the positive and good in her life. She knows how to tackle problems and how to recover from the loss of her emotional state. Her personality is such that she is the personification of struggle and hope. One important thing to survive in life is emotional independence. Emotional Independence is a quality in which a person is free or quite

strong about the emotional chaos of his/her life. For it, he/she is alone ample to face and recover. Rukmani is emotionally independent. Her inner state, thought process, memories, pride, and personality provide her emotional independence. As She clears-" I stood, alone yet not alone, for I had my thoughts, my memories, and my pride." (Markandaya)

With the character of Rukmani, we realize that she helps herself in her life. She never seeks anyone's shoulder in her problems. Even she supports her husband emotionally and financially rather than take his recourse in her emotional imbalance. The next thing that enables Rukmani to be very effective and resilient in her life is her attitude towards life. Having an optimistic attitude, she passes her pain and problems. She always hopes for a better future and the betterment of the present. She enjoys some days of prosperity in her life. But her hardships are more than her pleasures. She was never desperate and dejected in her life. Her relationship with her husband is also a crucial part of her life, although we know that Nathan, her husband, is not the leader of her life, yet a supportive step to endure all the pain and problems of life. For her existence, Nathan is a prominent pillar on whom she can rely and overcome any challenge.

Nathan, the next important character of the novel, is depicted as a poor farmer to whom a rich man gives his daughter (Rukmani) due to financial crisis. As a husband, he does all the work she can to give happiness and pleasures to his wife and family. Like his wife, he is also bestowed with the quality of resilience and endurance. He doesn't leave hope for a bright future like his wife; he also believes that everything will be fine after a while. He also faces the hardships in his life; his resilience makes him capable of accepting the changes. He understands what is not easy to change he accepts. Having faith in his personality, he keeps working hard for his survival. His resilience gives him the power to face the challenges of his life.

Endurance and resilience are also marked in his personality in the face of adversity. He makes his home for his wife. He is fully committed to his family. He believes that he is better equipped to face any challenge with his family present. The harsh reality of rural life and after the Industrial Revolution in the village also makes him resilient, and it enhances the quality

But the blame was totally on her for not producing a child within time. So the in-laws' family forced her husband to leave Ira and return to her parental home. She faces this mental, emotional challenge for a long time with her in-laws. She endures everything herself without any complaint to her parents. She is abandoned by her husband due to his family pressure. Her words are enough to reveal her resilience, "Leave me alone, Mother. I have seen this coming for a long time. The reality is much easier to bear than the imaginings. At least now there is no more fear, no more necessity for lies and concealment." (Markandaya 52)

Endurance in the face of modernity

Markandaya's novel also presents the other phase of resilience, which is endurance. Endurance is not the mark of weakness; it reveals the person's strength to bear the problems and wounds. It is also depicted in the novel not only in human behavior but also in the form of a situation. We meet endurance in the form of modernization. She has a modern approach, so she earns money by doing different work for survival. She doesn't check her son working in a factory because somewhere in her heart she knows modernization of civilization will enhance their living. Industrialization was also a part of this modernization.

Industrialization started in India after the country's independence, directly or indirectly. The novelist has painted a pointed image of Indian society. The image presents that farming was in a state of decline, and Industrialization was its initial phase. In the novel, we find that a tannery has been

established and numerous people have joined it for employment. The establishment of the tannery is an example of industrialization, so in a futuristic approach, people joined it, but it couldn't provide positive results in employment. Factory workers are exploited, and they are not paid proper wages for their labor in the factory. In the starting phase, everything seems bright, but after some time, its brightness turns into unbearable heat. The workers had to work more than the certain time limits on fewer wedges. Endurance comes in the workers' life in their working hours. Tannery workers suffer so much because they don't have any option except to work there; it was the only mean to keep their body and soul together. Commercial greed creates problems for the workers. This industry, in the beginning, seems a source of joy and success for human life, but later turns into a source of moral and economic disruption.

Commercial greed, urban culture, and corruption of the industry destroy the values and harmony of village life. Even the agricultural land is occupied by the industry, so the farmers have lost their land for farming. They were compelled to leave their traditional occupation of farming in the hope of new means of survival in the tannery. They don't have any other option. With the passage of time they couldn't understand the hidden loss of the tannery's establishment. Even though they weren't accustomed to the mechanical labor of tannery. It was not easy for them to be skilled in machinery labor. They were unknown in the urban working culture. They aren't even aware of their rights to work in the industries. They have no other recourse. They have to endure the situations and prepare for their upcoming hard life. A single person was not enough to fight these established commercial owners. So they were poor after getting a job and doing more labor. Even though they have not been able to earn the enough food for their family. In this way, we can observe that what they earn is little to meet their needs, and they should work together. This industrialization was impactful but not in a positive way. The destructive consequences of unregulated industry and the villagers' endurance for survival.

Economic struggles are also seen in the novel through the characters. The scenario of the novel is presented post-independence of Indian society; at that point, the economic status was not so good. Not only Rukmani's family but also the neighbors face the same

economic struggle in their lives. Rukmani's youngest son, Kutty, has died due to a lack of food, and this condition arose due to the nonexistence of money. Ira and Kunthi go into prostitution to survive themselves and their family. Even Kunthi uses her beauty to extort food from Nathan and Rukmani.

Starvation is also another marinating consequence of that time. Endurance is also reflected in the face of starvation. Every family is affected by chronic hunger. Kutty, the youngest son of Rukmani and Nathan, died from malnutrition. The whole family faced starvation numerous times in their life. The family goes through extreme poverty in life, and difficulties come with life. Every day, they fight a battle of starvation and poverty to survive.

Dr Deepak Kapur says, "Hunger not only kills, it also degrades and dehumanizes. It forces Kunthi into prostitution, and later she blackmails Rukmani and Nathan during their most trying times, when they are famished. It forces Ira to turn to prostitution in a courageous effort to preserve the life of her child-brother Kutty, who is unwell and dying. Raja steals from the tannery and is slain. Poverty is a crime, as illustrated by the stories of Nathan and Rukmani" (Kapur)

Poverty is the mother of numerous problems. Extreme poverty is the quack, Meir. The hardest aspect of life's pain is living in poverty. Where people do not have enough to eat, to wear, or to abide. They are devoid of the basic facilities of life. Rukmani and Nathan are creatures of the same type. Most of the pleasures and happiness are snatched from them due to the insufficiency. In the pre- and post-independence Indian society, extreme poverty reached its peak. The people were leading a hard life. Poverty creates the situation, and survival becomes more important than dignity. In the hope of good days, the harshest part of poverty passes in their lives. They expect happiness with a small piece of land, and crops mostly depend on the weather. Morality has not existed in poverty for so long. As we come across Ira, Kunthi, and Raja, they are the main victims of poverty. To survive in their lives, the first two are adept at prostitution, and the last one steals something from the tannery. In this novel, the novelist shows that being poor is a curse. The extreme poverty led to chronic hunger and malnutrition. The endurance is depicted in the character of Rukmani and Nathan. Both of them have endurance in life. Every pain and penury is tolerated by them in the hope of a bright future. They don't lose their morality and never commit any sin or do anything wrong to pursue their basic needs. Exploitation is the marred face of modernization, especially in industrialization. In the name of modernization, Rukmani's village witnessed the establishment of a tannery. First, the owners have occupied their land to build the tannery, and they were compelled to do labor at the tannery on their arbitrated wedges. Endurance is the other side of modernization in the novel. Tannery workers have no option but to earn their livelihood. In the beginning, they lured the workers to give more wages for fewer hours. By the time they are fully

dependent on the tannery, suddenly they rise working hours and low wage without any notice or information. This kind of exploitation is also endured by the people of Rukmani's village. Even being aware of the right to life, Rukmani also has no option except to endure the situation. She bears a lot of the blame for the development because her son Raja was slain in the Tannery on theft charges.

Unemployment is one of the results of poverty. The loss of land is the main reason for unemployment. Although the tannery is established, there is no particular reformation in the conditions of the people. The tannery owner didn't pay them properly. Indian society is traditionally and emotionally connected to land and farming, so the loss of land is the loss of their livelihood.
